

Kara of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate is an advocate for abused and abandoned animals. Her dog and 15 cats are all finally spayed and neutered, thanks to our Program Partner Cheryl with the Lake Traverse Animal Rescue in Sisseton, South Dakota.

Cheryl benefits from our Reservation Animal Rescue (RAR) program, which provides animal care supplies and grant funds to help subsidize spay/neuter clinics.



Emergency Services

The physical environment in our service area is often harsh, giving rise to a wide range of environmental disasters – and Elders are especially vulnerable.

Robert, age 58, helps others every day by performing maintenance for the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate on the Lake Traverse Reservation in South Dakota.

He recently helped distribute PWNA's Winter Emergency Boxes to Lake Traverse Elders. These boxes include generous supplies like personal care items and nonperishable food to help Elders make it through the harsh winter.

Food Services

Only 26% of Native communities are within a mile of a supermarket, so rising costs and a lack of local grocery stores are a constant concern. One way to improve food access is through PWNA's Food Pantry service, where staple foods and other essentials are provided to food pantries like Our Lady of Fatima Church in Chinle, Arizona, for families in need.

Anna, a 77-year-old Navajo Elder, is one of many benefiting from the Food Pantry service. With a total income of only \$1,400 a month, it can be a struggle to make ends meet: *"Prices are so high... [the food pantry] helps us save money."*
