Program Partners like Ethel at Wakpá Wašté Animal Shelter on the Cheyenne River Reservation in South Dakota receive supplies and grants from our Reservation Animal Rescue (RAR) program to care for homeless cats and dogs.

## GRANT UPDATE

The General Motors grant has provided another year of professional and personal development training with our 4 Directions Development Program. A new cohort in the Southwest has 16 emerging leaders representing tribes from Zuni, Navajo, Hopi, White Mountain Apache, and Yavapai-Apache Nation. This cohort has one training session under their belt and they have learned about their strengths and talents and created a personal life plan with values, and a mission statement that helped them generate their goals. They also defined Lateral Violence within Native Communities and discussed how they have dealt with it and addressed healthy ways of combatting it.
