SERVED THROUGH FOOD SERVICES

1 in 4 Indigenous families struggle to keep food on the table. PWNA's programs improve food access through services like Standard Food, where nonperishable foods are supplied to Senior Center partners for use in preparing healthy, hot meals for their Elders.

Our Program Partner at the Pisinemo Senior Center on the Tohono O'odham reservation in southern Arizona serves over 30 Elders. Carmen, a 65-year-old Tohono O'odham Elder, has been participating in the center's meals and activities for over eight years. "There is surely a need here. I have trouble getting to the store, so having [food and other supplies] here is a huge help."

GRANT UPDATE

Thanks to a grant from Margaret A. Cargill Philanthropies (MACP), PWNA was able to onboard and deploy Harold Tiger, a Collaboration and Training Specialist who is a certified instructor for FEMA CERT, American Heart Association CPR, Mental Health First Aid and SD Emergency Medical Technician.

Since his onboarding, 64 individuals in Native American communities have been certified in CERT and 51 individuals have been certified in CPR.

The grant is also supporting two partners and one PWNA staff to begin certification as National recognized FEMA instructors in the specialized Tribal Curriculum. These additional specialists will be able to train more tribal communities so that they can be prepared when disaster or environmental emergencies strike.
